### Portfolio overview

### Q. What is the Portfolio's investment strategy?

**A.** The Portfolio seeks long-term growth of capital. Under normal circumstances, the Portfolio invests at least 80% of its net assets, plus borrowings for investment purposes, if any, in equity securities, or other investments with similar economic characteristics, of medium capitalization companies. The Portfolio may invest up to 20% of its assets in equity securities of companies other than medium capitalization companies. The Portfolio may invest up to 25% of its net assets (at the time of investment) in foreign securities.

The Portfolio pursues a disciplined core investment strategy combining in-depth fundamental and quantitative analysis to identify attractive investment candidates. We obtain market information about the universe of investment candidates and distill that information to select prospective investments. We then establish market-implied growth and return expectations based on current trading prices and challenge those expectations using our insight and proprietary analysis.

While markets are relatively efficient in the long term with economic fundamentals driving asset prices, market inefficiencies often occur, as evidenced by the disproportionate volatility of stock prices relative to publicly available information. We believe our disciplined investment process, employing quantitative and fundamental analysis, can help exploit these market inefficiencies.

# Q. What were the overall market conditions during the Portfolio's reporting period?

**A.** Equities delivered positive returns during the twelve-month reporting period ended December 31, 2023, with the broad market S&P 500 Indexi advancing 26.29% and the Russell Midcap Indexii returning 17.23%. The strong performance of artificial intelligence ("AI") beneficiaries, optimism over an economic soft landing and a dovish pivot by the Federal Reserve Board (the "Fed") late in the year helped the Russell Midcap Growth Indexiii outperform the Russell Midcap Value Indexiv by over 1,300 basis points on a one-year basis, with the indexes returning 25.87% and 12.71%, respectively.

Within the Russell Midcap Index, investor enthusiasm about the potential for Al led to outsized returns by the information technology ("IT") (+36.25%) sector, while market enthusiasm over an economic soft landing helped propel performance of the industrials (+29.61%) sector. Continued interest rate hikes by the Fed to tame inflation caused a rise in 10-year Treasury yields through much of the year, which weighed on income-oriented sectors such as utilities (-2.28%) and consumer staples (-0.08%). The health care sector (+2.36%) was also out of favor due to rising health care system costs from increased utilization post-pandemic and fears that GLP-1 medication for diabetes and obesity could negatively impact other therapeutic areas.

# Portfolio overview (cont'd)

Initial signs of progress in the Fed's efforts to tame generationally high inflation supported equities in the first quarter of 2023, with strong performance among defensive and cyclical¹ stocks. In March, markets focused on the U.S. banking system after significant market losses in Silicon Valley Bank's securities portfolio spurred a run on the bank's deposits and resulted in the second-largest bank failure in U.S. history. This sparked a crisis of confidence across small and mid-size regional banks, as consumers shifted their deposits to larger banks perceived to be more stable. Although contagion concerns had eased by the end of the month, the crisis intensified concern over the probability and severity of a recession, as well as the prospect of tighter lending standards.

Stocks rose in the second quarter of 2023 as investors took cooling inflation to mean the Fed's tightening cycle was nearing its conclusion. Simultaneously, enthusiasm grew over the potential applications and benefits of Al. The result was positive overall market performance with gains particularly concentrated in a handful of mega cap companies in the IT, consumer discretionary and communication services sectors.

Market leadership began to broaden by the beginning of the third quarter of 2023 as betterthan-expected corporate earnings and cooling inflation created a growing chorus for a soft landing for the economy (rather than a recession). This helped provide a bid to smaller and more economically sensitive stocks on the hopes that the Fed would reach its rate hike zenith, or even reduce rates, before the end of the year. However, as the quarter wore on, stubborn inflationary data, continued economic resiliency and surging U.S. Treasury yields pushed out rate cut expectations further into the future.

In the fourth quarter of 2023, signs of cooling inflation, a slowing labor market and favorable U.S. Treasury auction volumes caused bond yields to plummet, providing a strong bid to equities across the market with growth resuming its leadership position. A drastic shift in investor sentiment toward anticipation of an economic soft landing and a dovish pivot from the Fed, along with broadening market leadership, helped to swell the performance of mid-cap stocks, while the prospect of interest rate cuts as early as the first half of 2024 helped to spur a rally in more interest-rate sensitive market sectors.

### O. How did we respond to these changing market conditions?

**A.** During the period we sought to maintain a balance of companies with higher growth profiles as well as others with more attractive valuations by investing across all eleven sectors of the market. Our commitment to constantly improve the risk/reward of the portfolio kept us active during the reporting period in repositioning to capitalize on opportunities, operating quickly by moving on from business models with uncertain visibility and into of compounding, high return growth companies and more value-oriented names with quality fundamentals and clear paths to improvement to construct a portfolio that can work in many different market environments.

We made several adjustments within the financials sector during the reporting period, particularly in the wake of the March regional banking crisis. We entered the reporting period with a deliberate underweight to the sector and were invested in high-quality banks with sticky customer bases and minimal credit risk which would allow them to persevere even if the U.S. were to enter a recession. However, the collapse of Silicon Valley Bank had a substantial and rapid ripple effect across the entire banking system, creating a panic that weighed on even the most fundamentally-sound banks. In the face of such an unquantifiable risk and diminished earnings prospects from greater capital requirements we moved swiftly to exit positions in First Republic Bank and Western Alliance Bancorp, both of which found themselves caught up in a panic that weighed on even the most fundamentally-sound banks. However, we also took advantage of the compelling entry prices to add high-quality super-regionals we felt would be long-term beneficiaries of deposit reshuffling. These included companies such as PNC Financial Services Group and US Bancorp, both of which have strong brands, diverse geographical and funding footprints and smaller expense growth than their regional peers. We continued to refine our exposure through diversification such as an investment in Raymond James Financial, a high-quality leader in the wealth management industry, in the third quarter of 2023. With a compelling valuation and solid growth in investment inflows, we believe the company can capitalize on any improvement in the capital markets.

During the reporting period, we also reduced the Portfolio's underweight allocation to the communication services sector through the purchase of new holding Pinterest and adding to existing holding Endeavor Group Holdings. Pinterest operates a social media platform where users can express their interests and discover ideas through images they "pin" to their pages. The platform and its loyal, growing user base are strong assets which the company has struggled to monetize. However, we believe the new CEO's initiatives to improve advertisers' return on investment and greater customer conversion are showing signs of early success. By making the platform more shoppable, we believe Pinterest can accelerate its growth and improve its cash flow generation. Endeavor Group Holdings operates as an entertainment, sports and content company through its portfolio of brands including Ultimate Fighting Championship, Euroleague and others. Although the company faced uncertainty stemming from the acquisition of competitor Professional Fighters League by Saudi-backed SRJ Sports Investments and concerns over how the Writers Guild of America strike would impact the company's performance in the second half of 2023, we believe Endeavor is well positioned given upcoming television rights renewals and that its live events have significant upside potential.

We also took advantage of volatility within the energy sector to initiate a new position in Noble, a leading offshore drilling contractor for the oil and gas industry. Consolidation and underinvestment have significantly depleted the number of drilling ships available to meet the growing demand for offshore oil drilling, giving the company greater pricing power. Armed with a clean balance sheet and significant cash flow generation as daily rates for its

fleet rise, we believe the company will be a prime beneficiary of resurgent energy demand and investment in oil and gas drilling.

Rather than making big macro bets on the economy and market direction, we continue to stick to our process and philosophy of constructing a portfolio of growth compounders as well as value stocks with compelling opportunities for improvement. Our focus on strong balance sheets, cash flows and optimal capital deployment, as well as utilizing portfolio construction tools to reduce volatility and correlations, has left us well-positioned to balance this wide range of outcomes with companies driven by strong idiosyncratic narratives to compound and improve returns. Thankfully, we continue to find compelling opportunities as we explore the market for undervalued mid-cap stocks.

### Performance review

For the twelve months ended December 31, 2023, Class I shares of ClearBridge Variable Mid Cap Portfolio¹ returned 12.92%. The Portfolio¹s unmanaged benchmark, the Russell Midcap Index, returned 17.23% for the same period.

### **Total Annual Operating Expenses** (unaudited)

As of the Portfolio's current prospectus dated May 1, 2023, the gross total annual fund operating expense ratios for Class I and Class II shares were 0.83% and 1.08%, respectively.

### Q. What were the leading contributors to performance?

**A.** In absolute terms, the Portfolio had positive performance in nine of the eleven sectors in which it was invested for the reporting period, with largest positive contributions to returns coming from the industrials and IT sectors.

Relative to the benchmark, effects positively contributed to performance. Specifically, stock selection in the consumer staples, industrials, health care and communication services sectors, overweight allocations to the IT and industrials sectors and an underweight allocation to the utilities sector had positive impacts on returns.

In terms of individual Portfolio holdings, leading contributors to performance for the reporting period included Vertiv Holdings and API Group in the industrials sector, Marvell Technology in the IT sector, ICON in the health care sector and Expedia Group in the consumer discretionary sector.

### Q. What were the leading detractors from performance?

**A.** In absolute terms, the Portfolio had negative performance in two of the eleven sectors in which it was invested for the reporting period, with the detractors coming from the utilities and materials sectors

Relative to the benchmark, overall stock selection detracted from performance for the reporting period. Specifically, stock selection in the IT, consumer discretionary, financials, materials, utilities and real estate sectors, an overweight allocation to the consumer staples sector and an underweight to the consumer discretionary sector negatively impacted returns.

In terms of individual Portfolio holdings, leading detractors from performance included positions in First Republic Bank and Western Alliance Bancorp in the financials sector, Ashland in the materials sector, Etsy in the consumer discretionary sector and Eversource Energy in the utilities sector.

### O. Were there any significant changes to the Portfolio during the reporting period?

**A.** There were a number of Portfolio positions bought and sold over the course of the reporting period. The largest new holdings introduced during the period included Atkore, ATS, Clean Harbors and CAE in the industrials sector and Crown holdings in the materials sector. The largest positions sold during the period included First Republic Bank and Western Alliance Bancorp in the financials sector, Black Knight and CDW in the IT sector and Hasbro in the consumer discretionary sector.





### Notes to financial statements

### 1. Organization and significant accounting policies

ClearBridge Variable Mid Cap Portfolio (the "Portfolio") is a separate diversified investment series of Legg Mason Partners Variable Equity Trust (the "Trust"). The Trust, a Maryland statutory trust, is registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, as amended (the "1940 Act"), as an open-end management investment company.

Shares of the Portfolio may only be purchased or redeemed through variable annuity contracts and variable life insurance policies offered by the separate accounts of participating insurance companies or through eligible pension or other qualified plans.

The Portfolio follows the accounting and reporting guidance in Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification Topic 946, *Financial Services — Investment Companies* ("ASC 946"). The following are significant accounting policies consistently followed by the Portfolio and are in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles ("GAAP"), including, but not limited to, ASC 946. Estimates and assumptions are required to be made regarding assets, liabilities and changes in net assets resulting from operations when financial statements are prepared. Changes in the economic environment, financial markets and any other parameters used in determining these estimates could cause actual results to differ. Subsequent events have been evaluated through the date the financial statements were issued.

(a) Investment valuation. Equity securities for which market quotations are available are valued at the last reported sales price or official closing price on the primary market or exchange on which they trade. The valuations for fixed income securities (which may include, but are not limited to, corporate, government, municipal, mortgage-backed, collateralized mortgage obligations and asset-backed securities) and certain derivative instruments are typically the prices supplied by independent third party pricing services, which may use market prices or broker/dealer quotations or a variety of valuation techniques and methodologies. The independent third party pricing services typically use inputs that are observable such as issuer details, interest rates, yield curves, prepayment speeds, credit risks/spreads, default rates and quoted prices for similar securities. Investments in open-end funds are valued at the closing net asset value per share of each fund on the day of valuation. When the Portfolio holds securities or other assets that are denominated in a foreign currency, the Portfolio will normally use the currency exchange rates as of 4:00 p.m. (Eastern Time). If independent third party pricing services are unable to supply prices for a portfolio investment, or if the prices supplied are deemed by the manager to be unreliable, the market price may be determined by the manager using quotations from one or more broker/dealers or at the transaction price if the security has recently been purchased and no value has yet been obtained from a pricing service or pricing broker. When reliable prices are not readily available, such as when the value of a security has been significantly affected by events after the close of the exchange or market on which the security is principally traded, but before the Portfolio calculates its net asset value, the Portfolio values these securities as determined in accordance with procedures approved by the Portfolio's Board of Trustees.

Pursuant to policies adopted by the Board of Trustees, the Portfolio's manager has been designated as the valuation designee and is responsible for the oversight of the daily valuation process. The Portfolio's manager is assisted by the Global Fund Valuation Committee (the "Valuation Committee"). The Valuation Committee is responsible for making

# Notes to financial statements (cont'd)

fair value determinations, evaluating the effectiveness of the Portfolio's pricing policies, and reporting to the Portfolio's manager and the Board of Trustees. When determining the reliability of third party pricing information for investments owned by the Portfolio, the Valuation Committee, among other things, conducts due diligence reviews of pricing vendors, monitors the daily change in prices and reviews transactions among market participants.

The Valuation Committee will consider pricing methodologies it deems relevant and appropriate when making fair value determinations. Examples of possible methodologies include, but are not limited to, multiple of earnings; discount from market of a similar freely traded security; discounted cash-flow analysis; book value or a multiple thereof; risk premium/yield analysis; yield to maturity; and/or fundamental investment analysis. The Valuation Committee will also consider factors it deems relevant and appropriate in light of the facts and circumstances. Examples of possible factors include, but are not limited to, the type of security; the issuer's financial statements; the purchase price of the security; the discount from market value of unrestricted securities of the same class at the time of purchase; analysts' research and observations from financial institutions; information regarding any transactions or offers with respect to the security; the existence of merger proposals or tender offers affecting the security; the price and extent of public trading in similar securities of the issuer or comparable companies; and the existence of a shelf registration for restricted securities.

For each portfolio security that has been fair valued pursuant to the policies adopted by the Board of Trustees, the fair value price is compared against the last available and next available market quotations. The Valuation Committee reviews the results of such back testing monthly and fair valuation occurrences are reported to the Board of Trustees quarterly.

The Portfolio uses valuation techniques to measure fair value that are consistent with the market approach and/or income approach, depending on the type of security and the particular circumstance. The market approach uses prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or comparable securities. The income approach uses valuation techniques to discount estimated future cash flows to present value.

GAAP establishes a disclosure hierarchy that categorizes the inputs to valuation techniques used to value assets and liabilities at measurement date. These inputs are summarized in the three broad levels listed below:

- Level 1 unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical investments
- Level 2 other significant observable inputs (including quoted prices for similar investments, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, etc.)
- Level 3 significant unobservable inputs (including the Portfolio's own assumptions in determining the fair value of investments)

The inputs or methodologies used to value securities are not necessarily an indication of the risk associated with investing in those securities.

The following is a summary of the inputs used in valuing the Portfolio's assets carried at fair value:

- **(b) Foreign investment risks.** The Portfolio's investments in foreign securities may involve risks not present in domestic investments. Since securities may be denominated in foreign currencies, may require settlement in foreign currencies or may pay interest or dividends in foreign currencies, changes in the relationship of these foreign currencies to the U.S. dollar can significantly affect the value of the investments and earnings of the Portfolio. Foreign investments may also subject the Portfolio to foreign government exchange restrictions, expropriation, taxation or other political, social or economic developments, all of which affect the market and/or credit risk of the investments.
- (c) Security transactions and investment income. Security transactions are accounted for on a trade date basis. Interest income (including interest income from payment-in-kind securities) is recorded on the accrual basis. Amortization of premiums and accretion of discounts on debt securities are recorded to interest income over the lives of the respective securities, except for premiums on certain callable debt securities, which are amortized to the earliest call date. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date for dividends received in cash and/or securities. Foreign dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date or as soon as practicable after the Portfolio determines the existence of a dividend declaration after exercising reasonable due diligence. The cost of investments sold is determined by use of the specific identification method. To the extent any issuer defaults or a credit event occurs that impacts the issuer, the Portfolio may halt any additional interest income accruals and consider the realizability of interest accrued up to the date of default or credit event.
- (d) REIT distributions. The character of distributions received from Real Estate Investment Trusts ("REITs") held by the Portfolio is generally comprised of net investment income, capital gains, and return of capital. It is the policy of the Portfolio to estimate the character of distributions received from underlying REITs based on historical data provided by the REITs. After each calendar year end, REITs report the actual tax character of these distributions. Differences between the estimated and actual amounts reported by the REITs are reflected in the Portfolio's records in the year in which they are reported by the REITs by adjusting related investment cost basis, capital gains and income, as necessary.
- **(e)** Distributions to shareholders. Distributions from net investment income and distributions of net realized gains, if any, are declared at least annually. Distributions to shareholders of the Portfolio are recorded on the ex-dividend date and are determined in accordance with income tax regulations, which may differ from GAAP.

# Notes to financial statements (cont'd)

- (f) Share class accounting. Investment income, common expenses and realized/unrealized gains (losses) on investments are allocated to the various classes of the Portfolio on the basis of daily net assets of each class. Fees relating to a specific class are charged directly to that share class.
- **(g) Compensating balance arrangements.** The Portfolio has an arrangement with its custodian bank whereby a portion of the custodian's fees is paid indirectly by credits earned on the Portfolio's cash on deposit with the bank.
- **(h) Federal and other taxes.** It is the Portfolio's policy to comply with the federal income and excise tax requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code"), as amended, applicable to regulated investment companies. Accordingly, the Portfolio intends to distribute its taxable income and net realized gains, if any, to shareholders in accordance with timing requirements imposed by the Code. Therefore, no federal or state income tax provision is required in the Portfolio's financial statements.

Management has analyzed the Portfolio's tax positions taken on income tax returns for all open tax years and has concluded that as of December 31, 2023, no provision for income tax is required in the Portfolio's financial statements. The Portfolio's federal and state income and federal excise tax returns for tax years for which the applicable statutes of limitations have not expired are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service and state departments of revenue.

(i) Reclassification. GAAP requires that certain components of net assets be reclassified to reflect permanent differences between financial and tax reporting. These reclassifications have no effect on net assets or net asset value per share. During the current year, the following reclassifications have been made:

### 2. Investment management agreement and other transactions with affiliates

Franklin Templeton Fund Adviser, LLC ("FTFA") (formerly known as Legg Mason Partners Fund Advisor, LLC ("LMPFA") prior to November 30, 2023) is the Portfolio's investment manager and ClearBridge Investments, LLC ("ClearBridge") is the Portfolio's subadviser. Western Asset Management Company, LLC ("Western Asset") manages the portion of the Portfolio's cash and short-term instruments allocated to it. FTFA, ClearBridge and Western Asset are indirect, wholly-owned subsidiaries of Franklin Resources, Inc. ("Franklin Resources").

Under the investment management agreement, the Portfolio pays an investment management fee, calculated daily and paid monthly, in accordance with the following breakpoint schedule:

FTFA provides administrative and certain oversight services to the Portfolio. FTFA delegates to the subadviser the day-to-day portfolio management of the Portfolio, except for the management of the portion of the Portfolio's cash and short-term instruments allocated to Western Asset. For its services, FTFA pays ClearBridge a fee monthly, at an annual rate equal to 70% of the net management fee it receives from the Portfolio. For Western Asset's services to the Portfolio, FTFA pays Western Asset monthly 0.02% of the portion of the Portfolio's average daily net assets that are allocated to Western Asset by FTFA.

As a result of expense limitation arrangements between the Portfolio and FTFA, the ratio of total annual fund operating expenses, other than interest, brokerage commissions, taxes, extraordinary expenses and acquired fund fees and expenses, to average net assets of Class I and Class II shares did not exceed 0.85% and 1.10%, respectively. These expense limitation arrangements cannot be terminated prior to December 31, 2025 without the Board of Trustees' consent. In addition, the manager has agreed to waive the Portfolio's management fee to an extent sufficient to offset the net management fee payable in connection with any investment in an affiliated money market fund (the "affiliated money market fund waiver"). The affiliated money market fund waiver is not subject to the recapture provision discussed below.

During the year ended December 31, 2023, fees waived and/or expenses reimbursed amounted to \$2,599, all of which was an affiliated money market fund waiver.

FTFA is permitted to recapture amounts waived and/or reimbursed to a class during the same fiscal year if the class' total annual fund operating expenses have fallen to a level below the expense limitation ("expense cap") in effect at the time the fees were earned or the expenses incurred. In no case will FTFA recapture any amount that would result, on any particular business day of the Portfolio, in the class' total annual fund operating expenses exceeding the expense cap or any other lower limit then in effect.

Franklin Distributors, LLC ("Franklin Distributors") serves as the Portfolio's sole and exclusive distributor. Franklin Distributors is an indirect, wholly-owned broker-dealer subsidiary of Franklin Resources. Franklin Templeton Investor Services, LLC ("Investor Services") serves as the Portfolio's shareholder servicing agent and acts as the Portfolio's transfer agent and dividend-paying agent. Investor Services is an indirect, wholly-owned subsidiary of Franklin Resources. Each class of shares of the Portfolio pays transfer agent fees to Investor Services for its performance of shareholder servicing obligations. Investor Services charges account-based fees based on the number of individual shareholder accounts, as well as a fixed percentage fee based on the total account-based fees charged. In addition, each class reimburses Investor Services for out of pocket expenses incurred. For

the year ended December 31, 2023, the Portfolio incurred transfer agent fees as reported on the Statement of Operations, of which \$1,700 was earned by Investor Services.

All officers and one Trustee of the Trust are employees of Franklin Resources or its affiliates and do not receive compensation from the Trust.

### 9. Redemption facility

The Portfolio, together with other U.S. registered and foreign investment funds (collectively, the "Borrowers") managed by Franklin Resources or its affiliates, is a borrower in a joint syndicated senior unsecured credit facility totaling \$2.675 billion (the "Global Credit Facility"). The Global Credit Facility provides a source of funds to the Borrowers for temporary and emergency purposes, including the ability to meet future unanticipated or unusually large redemption requests. Unless renewed, the Global Credit Facility will terminate on January 31, 2025.

Under the terms of the Global Credit Facility, the Portfolio shall, in addition to interest charged on any borrowings made by the Portfolio and other costs incurred by the Portfolio, pay its share of fees and expenses incurred in connection with the implementation and maintenance of the Global Credit Facility, based upon its relative share of the aggregate net assets of all the Borrowers, including an annual commitment fee of 0.15% based upon the unused portion of the Global Credit Facility. These fees are reflected in the Statement of Operations. The Portfolio did not utilize the Global Credit Facility during the year ended December 31, 2023.
