Message from the Chairman and President

\$8.25M in community contributions
\$1.75M+ donated to support COVID-19 Relief Efforts

Over the past year, we have come together in extraordinary ways to face some of the biggest shared challenges of our lifetimes. The way our communities have rallied in response to the global pandemic, joined forces to address racial inequality, and stood up for our democracy has been both inspiring and humbling. We first and foremost want to express our gratitude to each and every one of our nonprofit partners and the countless other organizations in our communities where our employees live and work, which have stepped up to serve those most in need during this critical time.

This has been a year of resilience, change, and adaptation. To support our community partners who had to adapt their programs and systems to be able to continue their missions of serving those most in need while making transformative change, Pacific Life and the Pacific Life Foundation quickly adapted our corporate responsibility programs to fit the changing landscape and needs of our communities.

Soon after the first stay-at-home orders were issued, we reevaluated our charitable giving. We immediately removed restrictions for our 2020 program grants, helping to release \$2.1 million in much needed cash flow to 213 nonprofits nationwide. We then took a hard look at all our community-driven programs and quickly shifted our budget priorities to support the most pressing needs around COVID-19 relief efforts in our local communities. This resulted in more than \$1.75 million distributed to 422 organizations to help support the financial stability of individuals in our communities, provide food security to families in critical need, as well as fill the gap in much needed childcare services for essential workers. While we made the tough decision to pause our in-person Pacific Life Good Guys volunteer activities to protect our employees during the pandemic, we adapted by providing company-wide virtual volunteer events our employees and their family members could engage in from the safety of their home.



When we look at Pacific Life and how much we have achieved in more than 150 years as a business, we are proud to say our positive impact is not because of the work of a few, or because of a singular way of thinking. Instead, it is thanks to the commitment of thousands of talented individuals who make up our valued communities—each with different perspectives and experiences—all working together under a set of shared values.

As we look to the future, it is important for us to define not only what we want to change, but also what we want to remain the same. Prioritizing diversity, equity, and inclusion; communication and collaboration; valuing people and community; mobilizing our company to support meaningful and powerful change; demonstrating company pride; and building strong relationships with each other remain the cornerstones of our unique and strong culture at Pacific Life. Let us build that future together under the same guiding principles that allowed us to overcome so many challenges in 2020: by working together, putting people first, and exuding courage and resilience in all we do.

Donations provided to artistic and cultural programs, including performing arts centers, museums, and zoos.


PACIFIC LIFE FOUNDATION AND PACIFIC LIFE TOTAL CONTRIBUTIONS (PAID)*

SUPPORTING OUR NONPROFIT PARTNERS AND COMMUNITIES

Many of our nonprofit partners have been at the forefront of providing critical services to meet the needs of families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. We are proud to have been able to support both our nonprofit partners and our communities in several different ways, including fulfilling our commitment to invest more than \$1.75 million in COVID-19 relief efforts.

To support the immediate financial needs of our nonprofit partners, the Pacific Life Foundation unrestricted all 2020 program grants distributed in January 2020, allowing our 213 grantees to direct nearly \$2.1 million in funds toward general operations or the greatest needs of their organization, such as extending job security to their workforce.

3TS OF EDUCATION

The Pacific Life Foundation continued its commitment to strengthening the learning environment through the 3Ts of Education program, where grants, specified for Teacher Training, Technology, or Textbooks, are awarded to K-12 schools with concentrations of children and grandchildren of Pacific Life employees. In 2020, these grants became especially important, helping to support the changing environment due to the COVID-19 pandemic. \$572,500 in 3Ts grants were distributed to 165 K-12 schools in our communities, bringing our total investment in our local schools to \$8.9 million since 1998.
